The very next day the Park was asked to give a home to a pet sheep named Jess from a local smallholding, where she had had several lambs over a number of years. **Jess's** mothering instincts took over immediately and she and **Mars** are now inseparable.

In memory of Kit

Kit was only 23 yrs of age but her start in life was very poor as she was tethered by wire around her ankles to stop her wandering. This had damaged her tendons making her permanently lame and caused the hair to lose its pigment, which explained the white hair just above her ankles. In March she stopped wandering the Park as she always did with **Copper** and **Colleen**. The vet visited and said that as she was in so much pain from her feet despite daily doses of strong medication, for her sake it was the end of the road, so on Thursday 25th March 2010 we said a very sad goodbye.

Credit Crunch

Well last time I told you that I had heard about this thing called the "Credit Crunch" and it was not to do with crunching carrots! Our people have said that this crunch has caused our visitor numbers to drop so we have been very grateful for those that have visited us or adopted us online, by mail or on the phone, thank you all very much. I have recently heard that we now have a charity and can collect something called gift aid, which gets us more money to pay for feed etc. Will tell you more in this newsletter.

Carrot crunch

Well about a year ago we did stop hearing the crunch of carrots as our people stopped selling carrots for visitors to feed us. This was because **Coppe**r my old friend, who is now well over 40, has started to lose the swallowing reflex in her throat, like elderly humans do and stands with her tongue hanging out (a bit like Old David Ha-Ha). We had to have the vet out three times in ten days to get carrots out of her and we nearly lost her the last time so carrots were off the menu! They now sell a special Donkey Diet feed pellet, which we all like and **Copper** can eat.

Donkey Rides

When we opened for the summer season at Easter we had to make the very tough decision to stop donkey rides. The reason was that most of the riding donkeys were getting too old (just like Old David!) and in discussion with the vet it was decided that they should be retired. The young donkeys are not yet ready to give rides and the Irish Boys in particular are still a bit too flighty. Many of our visitors were disappointed but the introduction of "pat a pet" "groom a donkey" and "take a donkey for a walk", has been a great success. **Teddy** has a trick of taking visitors to the bottom of the park for grass and refusing to come back!

Children of Chernobyl

Once again this summer the Park was pleased to host a free visit for a group of children from the Chernobyl disaster area, and they spent a day with us.

Minty Moo & Crystal

You will remember that last year I told you about **Minty Moo** and how he came to be at the park and why he had to have an eye removed. **MintyMoo** has been so much happier since his painful eye was removed and continued to go to shows winning rosettes and cups with Bethany riding him. A while ago **MintyMoo** was retired and Bethany got **Crystal** a Dartmoor pony on fulltime foster care from the Mare and Foal Sanctuary. **Crystal** has settled into life at the park and does not mind donkeys unlike many horses and ponies. **Crystal** and Bethany have already won lots of rosettes including a "show championship" & "reserve show championship" but **Crystal** has not lost her trick of not wanting to be caught except for food!
